

Me and My Grown-up Poetic Collage: Inspired by Shin Yu Pai and Torea Frey

A HANDS-ON ART ACTIVITY
SHARED BY MONA EDUCATORS

Description

Using the poetry of Shin Yu Pai and collage by Torea Frey as inspiration, students will write a Verb Portrait Poem about themselves or their chosen adult, and publish their writing with a photo of them.

Vocabulary

- Verb list
- collage
- poetry terms

Age: Fifth Grade

Lesson Duration: Two to Four Days **Subjects**: Writing, Literature & Family

Materials

- A printed photograph of student and/or their grown-up (at least one)
- Sharpies, pencils, markers
- Construction paper or printer paper
- Glue sticks
- Scissors
- Instruction worksheet:

- Optional: Big Book of Families by Mary
 Hoffman, printer and paper for printing
 typed-up poems, other decorative materials
 available (stickers, glitter, stamps) and
 laminator and lamination sheets

Inspiration

Share the poetry by Shin Yu Pai and collage by Torea Frey to get students excited! Both are included at the end of this lesson.

Instructions

- **1)** Pass out the verb list and materials, and model the lesson by writing a "Me poem" on the whiteboard.
 - a. Write "my teacher" on the board.
 - b. Ask students for verbs that they think describe their teacher and write them down.
 - c. Ask students to put the verbs into descriptive sentences and construct an example poem.
- **2)** Next, have them create a list of verbs for themselves/their grown-up. Encourage them to think of hobbies, favorite foods, things that make them unique.
- **3)** Give them time to write, 30 minutes or so should be enough to create a short poem.
- **4)** Once they are ready to publish, they will have to think about how they want to arrange the poem and picture. Students can glue the poem to construction paper with their picture on the other side, run the picture through the printer to put the poem over it, or use a sharpie to hand write their poem. They can add more pictures or images from magazines to make a collage and decorate as much or as little as they want.
- 5) Optional: Laminate final product to display or take home!

layers of a life, stripped down to a family's fate —


the weight of being unseen — to travel a path back to


For Further Exploration: The Great Big Book of Families
