Subject: History

Clay Artifact Sculptures Inspired by Tracie Manso

Description

Students will make small clay sculptures that resemble artifacts found in archeological digs. Using their imagination, they will decide the purpose of their artifact.

Materials

- Clay
- Clay tools
- Paper plates for bases
- Videos from Since Time
 Immemorial: Long Before We
 Were Born (Click Here)

Instructions

- 1) Have the students watch the video to get ideas about what artifacts might be found in an archeological dig in this area and discuss.
- 2) Pass out materials and let students brainstorm what types of artifact they want to make. Go over vocabulary list to help form ideas if needed.
- 3) Students will then make their artifacts out of clay and share them with the class, talking about how each one might be used.

Elementary Outcomes

By the time Washington state students leave elementary school, they will:

- Understand that over 500 independent tribal nations exist within the
 United States today and that they interact with the United States, as well
 as each other, on a government-to-government basis;
- Understand tribal sovereignty is "a way that tribes govern themselves in order to keep and support their ways of life";
- Understand that tribal sovereignty predates treaty times;
- Understand how the treaties that tribal nations entered into with the United States government limited their sovereignty; and
- Identify the names and locations of tribes in their area.


