Poet Bios in Alphabetical Order

Jane Alynn

Jane Alynn is a poet and photographic artist. She is the author of *Necessity of Flight* (Cherry Grove, 2011), a fulllength poetry collection, and a chapbook, *Threads* & *Dust* (Finishing Line Press, 2005). Her poems have won awards, have appeared in numerous journals and anthologies, and those written in collaboration with visual artists have been exhibited in galleries. "As a poet, my primary task is to create new perceptions through language. My tools are words and sounds, their musical invocation and resonance, rhythm and movement, texture and emotional tone, as well as images that body forth the felt-idea of an experience, deepening the meanings and connections. Though my influences are diverse, the natural world with all its vicissitudes and contradictions provides my greatest inspiration. Trees in particular have long captivated my attention and reverence."

Solstice Black

Queer writer, speaker, and artist, Solstice Black (they/she), is a Junior at Western Washington University who is currently pursuing their degree in creative writing, with a passion for gender studies and good stories. They were runner-up in the Washington State Inspirational Speech Championship, came first place in the Moth StorySLAM, and are forthcoming in The Moth GrandSLAM in Seattle. Their work has appeared in journals such as Chautauqua and The Fantastic Other. They wrote this poem, which initially takes the form of a birth certificate, to connect a line through them and the women who came before, and the line "crunch and grind" pays homage to their mother Tennison's 2023 book, *Survival Strategies*.

Jodie Buller

Jodie Buller is the sexton for White Eagle Memorial Preserve, a wilderness cemetery in southern Washington, and she serves on the board for the Conservation Burial Alliance. She studied writing at the UW and has self-published 6 collections of poems. She has written for local papers in Whatcom and Skagit and hosted a variety of interview shows and documentaries for KSVR community public radio. When she is not at work in ponderosa and oak forest, she lives in a pocket of cedar forest on Swinomish land.

Michael Daley

Michael Daley retired from teaching at Mount Vernon High School 12 years ago; he has published poems in *American Poetry Review, Hudson Review, Ploughshares, New England Review, Rhino, North American Review, Writers Almanac, Raven Chronicles, Seattle Review, Jeopardy, Prairie Schooner, Cirque, Alaska Quarterly Review, Cascadia Review, and elsewhere. Founding editor of Empty Bowl, publisher of the Dalmo'ma anthologies, former Poet-in-Residence for the Washington State Arts Commission, Skagit River Poetry Foundation, Massachusetts Cultural Council, his reviews and essays have appeared in <i>Pacific Northwest Review of Books, Raven Chronicles, Port Townsend Leader,* and *Book/Mark Quarterly Review*. His collections of poetry include: *The Straits* (Empty Bowl, Port Townsend, 1983), *To Curve* (Wordtech Communications, Cincinnati, 2008), *Moonlight in the Redemptive Forest* (Pleasure Boat Studio, NYC, 2010), *Of a Feather* (Empty Bowl, Port Townsend, 2016) and *Born With* (Dos Madres,Loveland Ohio, 2020). His work has been awarded by the Washington State Arts Commission, Seattle Arts Commission, Seattle Arts Commission, artist Trust, Fulbright, and the National Endowment of the Humanities. Pleasure Boat Studio published his essays, *Way Out There* (2007) and his translation of *Alter Mundus* (2013) by Italian poet Lucia Gazzino. In 2022,he published three books—*Reinhabited: New & Selected Poems* (Dos Madres, Loveland OH), *Telemachus*, a novel (Pleasure Boat Studio, Seattle), and *True Heresies* (Cervena Barva, Somerville MA). He is managing editor for *The Madrona Project*, an anthology series (Empty Bowl, 2019-2024).



Randy Dills

I am a former academic and day laborer, living in a small converted barn on a wooded farm off Snee-Oosh Road. My work has appeared in national publications, such as Terrain.org, and in the recent volume of Washington poets edited by past poet Laureate, Rena Priest, *I Sing the Salmon Home*. In 2022, she won a national award for Excellence in Literary Poetry while attending a writing conference in San Francisco. Her work centers on themes of generational trauma, identity, and womanhood. She writes primarily in free verse and prose, and is currently working on her first poetry anthology. She has lived in Washington state her entire life.

DJ Lee

DJ Lee is a writer, scholar, artist, and regents professor of English at Washington State University and a scholarfellow of the Black Earth Institute. She grew up in Seattle and currently divides her time between Bellingham and Moscow, Idaho. She has published over a hundred articles, essays, and prose poems, the memoir *Remote: Finding Home in the Bitterroots* (Oregon State), and eight scholarly books, including *The Land Speaks* (Oxford).
